MUSIC NOTES

As I work on selecting music for our services for the remainder of the church year, I once again return to two inspiring lectures given years apart at the Sacred Music Workshop conducted each May for a number of years now by Dr. Laura Ellis at the University of Florida in Gainesville.

In the first of these, at a time when traditional vs. contemporary music was sometimes cause for discussion in some of our churches, our workshop clinician told us we have to be both prophet and priest in the music selections we offer our congregations. We have to be prophet as we share good contemporary music with our congregations and priest as we bless their memories with old favorites. In a lecture given by Dr. Ellis at our 2015 workshop, she led a discussion on the book *Trouble at the Table: Gathering the Tribes for Worship* by Carol Doran & Thomas Troeger. On the subject of music, the authors tell us that "Music often carries with it the force of personal memory" but go on to say that the trans-tribal purpose of music in the church is "to help the tribes gather as one to give thanks to the name of the Lord."

While I did not share some of the good contemporary works I had originally planned over the past few months, I did manage to include some hymns and music that some of you have told me have special meaning for you. I plan to continue to do this but could use some more of your wonderful suggestions. With a collection of hymnals which spans a number of denominations, it might be easier for me to find your favorite than you might think. So please do continue to share your favorites with me so I can hopefully continue to bless you with music you especially love. DEACON'S REPORT

I would like to focus my report on Kairos Prison Ministry as in October, I will be a volunteer clergy for my 16th Kairos weekend at MCI (Martin Correctional Institution). From Thursday October 17-Sunday October 20, I will be at the prison for weekend #51. We will be meeting with 36 prisoners to talk with great intensity (like a Cursillo Weekend) about Jesus Christ and Christianity. We hope to bring His love to them so they can feel that they are cared for by Him and their Christian Brothers and Sisters. We are reaching out to them just as Christ has told us to do for all prisoners.

This makes such a difference in their lives; it gives them hope for their futures. This weekend is just a beginning in our ministry. Our objective is to get them to form their own prayer groups at the prison so they can all help and support each other. Prison is a very negative environment where there are regular assault incidents, constant drug and alcohol abuse and almost no rehabilitative programs. We return to see them monthly for reunions and also offer interim retreats.

You can offer your help in many ways with this ministry. You can pray for them by filling out a prayer slip for a specific time when you will remember them in your prayers. We as volunteers are asked to contribute \$150 for the weekend from donations of others in our churches; if you are able you can help with this. The weekend costs us about \$5000 for our supplies and meals. Also we do posters and placemats for them. Our Sunday School Children help with this. The residents (inmates) love to take these placemats back to their rooms with wonderful messages from the children.

I think reaching out to these men who feel rejected and unloved is so important; it gives me a sense of helping others. I get inspired as well. Whatever you can do to help with this is so appreciated. We have over 100,000 inmates in our Florida prisons who really need our help so they can improve their lives both in prison and especially when they return to the community.

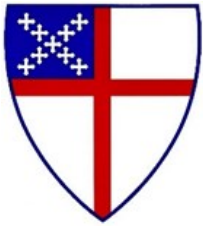
