# A MESSAGE FROM THE RECTOR

My Dear Friends:

## **Presiding Bishop Michael Bruce Curry to attend Diocesan Convention**

During the month of October, usually on the Friday and Saturday of the last weekend, our Diocese of Southeast Florida meets annually for what is called our “Diocesan Convention.”

The Convention, which is the primary representative governing or decision-making body of our diocese, comprises of clergy (*bishops, priests and deacons who are canonically resident in the diocese*) and normally two lay members who were elected as delegates by each congregation within the diocese. Both the clergy and lay delegates have seat, voice, and vote at the Convention.

The reason for meeting is to conduct diocesan business, including election of officers and members of various leadership bodies; approval of a budget for the upcoming year; setting mission strategy; and establishing diocesan policy and procedure by considering and voting on resolutions and approving

changes to the diocesan constitution and canons, if necessary. It is also an occasion for

communication, workshops, and displays; learning about and participating in shared mission and ministry; fellowship, community building and common prayer; and the celebration of the Holy Eucharist together as a diocesan community. When there is a vacancy of a bishop, this body elects that individual, whether it be a Bishop Diocesan, a Bishop Coadjutor, or a Bishop Suffragan.

Normally, each year, the Convention is held in one of the six deaneries on a rotation basis.

However, there is a plan to centralize the Convention after this upcoming one, so as to simplify the holding of the event. Nevertheless, this year's Convention, which is the 53<sup>rd</sup>, will be hosted by

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our Deanery (North Palm Beach), of which I have the pleasure to serve as its' Dean. **The Convention, which is on October 28 and 29, will be held at St. Mark's Episcopal Church in Palm Beach Gardens.**

It is a special convention for our Diocese since our **Presiding Bishop, the Most Reverend Michael B. Curry**, will be in attendance. Presiding Bishop Curry is known,

nationally and internationally, as a preacher who shares the Good News of Christ in a dynamic and often times animated way, regularly reminding Episcopalians that we are "the Episcopal branch of the Jesus Movement."



Since Bishop Curry is visiting our Diocese and it will probably be his only visit before his retirement in another two years, all of the members of the churches within our Diocese (who are not already attending as delegates to Convention) are invited to attend two events during the Convention.

**The first is the Convention Eucharist, on Friday, October 28, at 5 p.m., at which Presiding Bishop will be the Celebrant and Preacher. The second event will be the Formation Session, which Bishop Curry will lead, on Saturday, October 29, at approximately 9:45 a.m.**

**In order for members of our congregation to attend the service and Formation session in-person, registration will be necessary.** If you

wish to attend in-person, you will need to complete the registration form on the Diocesan website at: <https://www.diosef.org/upcoming-events> You may also go to the Diocesan website (<https://diosef.org>) click on News & Events, and then click on Upcoming Events.

The registration is needed so that the Bishop's Office may have an accurate count of the people attending.

I hope you will take advantage of this wonderful opportunity to see and hear our Presiding Bishop.

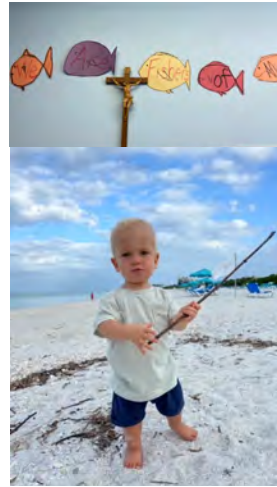

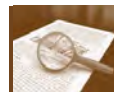

# Daughters of the King

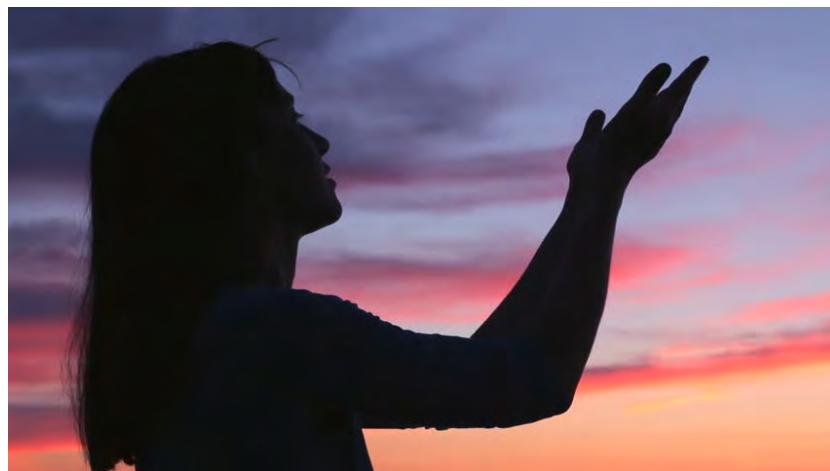


## Peering Into the Past

### **The Rue's**

A carbon copy of a letter to Mrs. Lois Rue, Stuart, dated 17 January 1929, gives insight in to the musical history of the church. She is the first organist named in any surviving records.

"Dear Sir [sic],

I am instructed by the Vestry of All Saints Church to request you to act as Musical Director for All Saints Church for the ensuing year.

The Vestry wishes to express to you their thanks and appreciation of your services in the past and to say that they will very greatly appreciate your acceptance of this position for another year.

The Vestry would be very glad to arrange to recompense you for your services, if such action would meet with your approval."

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# All Saints' Cemetery



Back before COVID-19 arrived, the Cemetery team raised funds through the inaugural self-guided cemetery tour to bring in experts from the National Park Service to train the cemetery staff on how to raise sunken grave markers, to repair and properly restore markers AND how to safely clean grave markers.

We're very excited that now that we are "post COVID," this training has been scheduled for the week of October 17-21. On October 18<sup>th</sup>, from 4-6p.m., the National Park Service Team will do a demonstration for everyone and anyone. The presentation is called "Cemetery Preservation Training and Gravemarker Cleaning." Dr Dennis Montagna, whose parents are interred here will be one of the

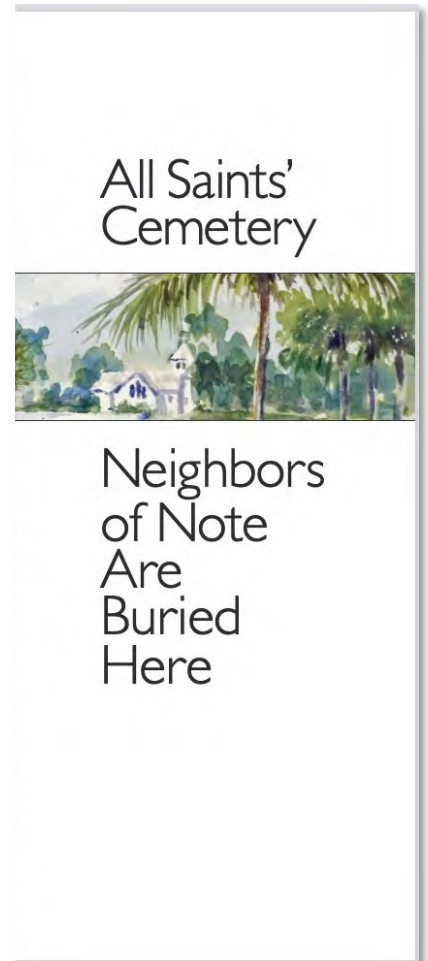
instructors. **Come & See!**

Those of you who drive the short road up the hill towards the church will see the difference after the training.

This year's Self-Guided cemetery Tour is titled "Our Neighbors of Note Are Buried Here." These neighbors are an eclectic group of educators, musicians, entrepreneurs, and community servants. The graves of these individuals will be marked for the self-guided walking/driving tour between Halloween & Veterans Day.

Now that the sprinklers are working due to last year's tour & Go Fund Me page, this year's proceeds will go towards having green grass growing throughout all the cemetery!

The tour booklets will be on sale Sundays, October 30 and November 6 after each service. They are available at the Cemetery Office between 9 a.m. and 1 p.m. Monday – Friday. Same low price as in \$15 a copy. Copies of our two previous tours "The Pioneers are buried

**Presenters –**  
**Dennis Montagna** is the Acting Program Manager for History and Preservation Assistance in the Philadelphia Regional Office of the National Park Service. He also directs the Park Service's Monument Research & Preservation Program, which provides comprehensive assistance in the interpretation and care of historic cemeteries, outdoor sculpture and public monuments to managers of National Park sites and to other constituents nationwide. Dennis holds a BA degree from Florida State University, a Master's degree in Art History from the University of Wisconsin-Madison and a Ph.D. from the University of Delaware. He carried out subsequent studies at ICCROM, the International Center for Conservation in Rome, Italy. He currently serves as President of the Association for Gravestone Studies.

**Jason Church** is the Chief of Technical Services at the National Center for Preservation Technology and Training. He completed his MFA in Historic Preservation at the Savannah College of Art and Design. Over the past 15 years with the National Park Service, Jason has presented over 100 cemetery care lectures and workshops. He is a Professional Associate of the American Institute for the Conservation of Historic and Artistic Works and the current Conservation Chair of the Association for Gravestone Studies.

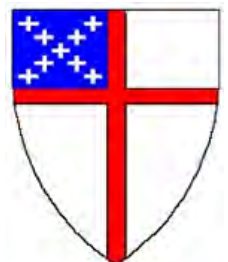

# Lights

Ok, so I was out on my tractor mowing the other day, and I was doing what I usually do and that is praying and talking out loud; having a conversation with God.

I don't know what started this thought, but I couldn't let go of it and now I want to put it in your head. There is no right or wrong answer to the question I am going to ask, just something to think about. A Bible verse came to my mind, over and over again.

God said, **“Let your light shine before men, that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father who is in heaven.”**

*Mathew 5:16*

I began to think what kind of light do I shine for the Lord? There are so many types of lights and associated watts. Some lights impart urgency, while others convey a relative sense of calm.

A steady glowing light, a flashing light, a piercing laser light, a muted dim nightlight, a strobe light, perhaps an ultraviolet light, there are spot lights and blinding bright searchlights. And what about the color of the light, does that mean anything? If we see a flashing blue light in our rearview mirror it has an effect on us. Green light usually means GO and red means STOP or danger. Yellow means CAUTION, not speed up (even though many Martin County drivers don't seem to realize this). A violet colored light is comforting. Many different combinations of light can be mesmerizing.

Is the intensity of the light meaningful? Did you know that some scientists report that you could see a single candle flame for 30 miles if it wasn't for the curvature of the earth?

So, getting back to letting God's light shine.

What kind of light do you see God giving you, and what does it say to others who see it? Are we a welcoming beacon of hope... or perhaps a lighthouse warning of the dangers ahead? Do we hide our light under a bushel?

This may be one of the first songs you learned in Sunday school, no doubt you sang the song: “This little light of mine, I'm gonna let it shine...”

Final thoughts about God's different lights. God predestined man to invent all the above lights and gave man the colors to use, but I need to mention just two lights God has given us. Both of these are on the opposite end of the spectrum.

First, the mighty and awesome Lightning Bolt! Blinding light and a deafening thunder clap to go with it. It's pretty much deadly... Anyone who has experienced a close call with lightening will tell you it is breathtaking, overwhelming, instant and terrifying all at the same time.

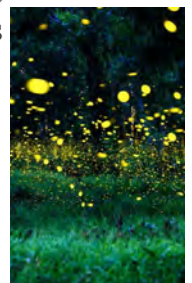
Now, the other end of the spectrum, God's mild mannered and timid creature that gives children so much joy in the early summer nights and that is the lightening bug. Its gentle glow almost begs us to reach out and take one in our hands, and we do.

Jesus said that we (His disciples) are the light of the world. We must not hide that light under a bushel or in a church building. We must let it shine.

Groggy explained, “What I was trying to say was: Trust God, Stop worrying, DO something instead. We are a very diverse family here in the garden, and like the folks that come here to church we have some different needs. We all need shelter from the wind.

“Greta and I might like the rain, so most of the time, sitting here under the ferns is just fine with us. You and Draco have wings – you might need to take shelter from the high

winds and the pelting rain. I can suggest the cracks and creases of the many trees; but in a tornado or hurricane those same trees may sway a bit much. If I were you, I would think about choosing the eaves of the building. Trust

God to help you find just the right spot. Check out over the stairs into church that looks tucked away from the wind too .... And Bea, talk to Him!"

"(Buzz) Groggy you have made me feel both better and confused at the same time. Gosh, he's asleep! Groggy, I need to know something wake up!"

"Forget about it! Trying to wake him up is usually very difficult!" Greta complained, "I've asked him many times to wake up but he's either fast asleep or he wants to be asleep – so he pretends! Come ask me Miss Bea, Greta will try to answer your questions."

"Oh, thank you Greta. (Buzz) How do I ask God a question? I can't see him. You both talk as though God and Jesus are your friends and they here in the garden. I've flown all over here and even into the cemetery looking for them. (Buzz)"

"Miss Bea, Miss Bea, I can answer that one!"

"Little-One, (Buzz). When did you move over here? I saw you napping under the ferns earlier."

Little-One explained, "God is everywhere, and He is right in my heart. He is in Groggy's and Greta's hearts too; and he can be in yours! You have to believe in Him and know Jesus is our savior. I can't see God either; but for sure and

for certain, I can see the things he provides for us. Right Greta?"

"Little-One, you are doing a fine job with your explanations. Do you remember what Father Tony said last Sunday?"

"Hmm, last Sunday was the story about the poor man with sores all over his body. The Rich man didn't even see him, though I don't know how. I heard someone read the story and that rich man just walked right by the poor man with the sores. Father Tony said God has given us lots to be thankful for and we need to be good stewards of those things and be repentant when we forget to be thankful. We need to value each other and help others. How we assist others makes a difference. We are all in need of God's grace and his mercy. Did I forget anything Greta?"

"Little-one: Maybe we can re-listen to Father's sermon on YouTube tomorrow; but you remembered some of the very important parts.

"Bea, We all need to get the garden ready for this bad weather; let's all get going on that and think about how God is our protector and provider while we work. After a storm there is always clean-up to do. I suspect since the shutters were not put on the church building windows this storm will be a bit milder than reports coming in from my relatives on Florida's west coast.

"Helping each other was my point because we need to be helpful in a way that will benefit the person or critter we are trying to help. I don't know how to help the lizards; but I need to ask them. Groggy was letting you know where some good places that are away from the wind. That is useful information for you.

"The advice being given by the authorities on the west coast is very different—they are being told to fly east. See, we are helping each other in a beneficial way; because God calls us to be his hands here and now, and in the coming weeks!"

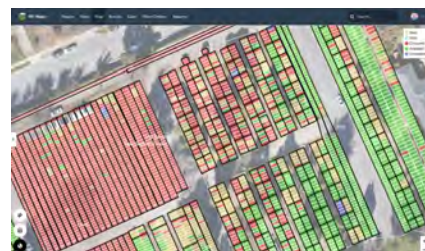

We are moving our paper records system to a cloud based digital system, Cemify. We are beginning the process by digitizing the cemetery plots, using the information that Bowman consulting provided to us after the project last year, which was sponsored by Doug Smith and Martin County. This will be a long and challenging process, which will include auditing each of our many records, including five (5) rolodexes, four (4) paper binders, and approximately 15GB of scanned paper records on our computer system. Ultimately, all records will be loaded into the system which will allow the cemetery staff to easily visualize which plots are available, which are already sold and which are already filled. Work orders and sales

slips will be fully integrated into the system and reports that are easily consumable can be generated (for example, a report on veterans who are buried here). In addition, parishioners, historians, and loved ones will be able to easily locate where a grave can be found, utilizing Find A Grave whether the cemetery staff is on site or not. It will be exciting to be wholly in the 21st century!

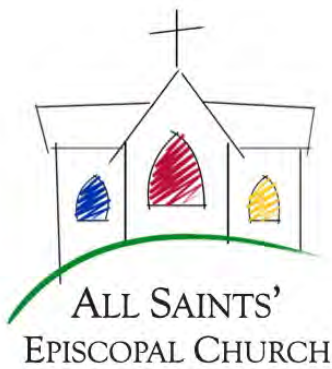
