A MESSAGE FROM THE RECTOR

My Dear Friends:

The 53rd Diocesan Convention

Clerical and Lay delegates gathered on Friday, October 28, and Saturday, October 29 for the 53rd Diocesan Convention of the Episcopal Church in Southeast Florida. It was the first in -person convention since 2019, due to the global viral pandemic. Hosted by the North Palm Beach Deanery and held at St. Mark's Episcopal Church, Palm Beach Gardens, Bishop Peter Eaton called the gathering to order at 1:30 p.m. with prayer and a welcome. The Deans, including me, presided at various parts of the Convention.

The featured guest of the Convention was the

Most Reverend Michael Bruce Curry, our Presiding Bishop and Primate. Bishop Curry was previously invited to attend the 50th Anniversary celebrations of our Diocese but due to the pandemic was unable to do so. He was the Celebrant and Preacher at the Convention Eucharist, which was attended by bishops of other Christian denominations including the Evangelical Lutheran Church of America in Florida and the Bahamas. the Mar Thoma Church, Diocese of North America and Europe, and the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Miami. The Right Reverend Moises Quezada Mota, the

Bishop of our companion diocese of the Dominican Republic, his wife, Mary Jeannette; the Right Reverend W. Michie Klusmeyer, former Bishop of West Virginia and currently the Canon to the Presiding Bishop for Ministry within the Episcopal Church, and Sharon Jones, the Executive Assistant to the Presiding Bishop, were in attendance.

Since the Eucharist was held on the Feast of St. Simon and St. Jude, the Presiding Bishop

referenced Jude as the patron of hopeless causes, stating that sometimes the world in which we live feels like a hopeless cause. However, he chose as his biblical text, words from 2 Corinthians 5: 14-18, a letter written by St. Paul who also knew about hopeless causes. Titling his sermon simply as "We shall overcome," he focused on the opening words of the text, "The love of Christ urges us on ..." (NRSV) and compared other versions of this same text: "The love of Christ constraineth us to move..." (KJV), "The love of

Christ compels us... (NIV), "The love of Christ controls us..." (RSV), "The love of Christ rules us (Good News). "We shall overcome," the hatred, the divisiveness, the selfishness, replacing it with the love of Christ, no longer

living for ourselves but for Christ. His sermon could be summarized in words, which he quoted from Jimi Hendrix: "When the power of love overcomes the love of power then the world will know peace." During the service, the Very Rev. Dr. Donna Mote (The Keys), the Very Rev. Roberta Knowles (North Dade), the Very Rev. Lee Davis (Broward), and I (North Palm Beach) installed as Deans of our respective deaneries.

Presiding Bishop Curry spoke on Saturday morning about "Being a Beloved Community," in which he outlined several examples of how we are to live as a beloved community. His presentation and his sermon were both inspiring, enlightening, and spiritually fulfilling. The delegates, divided in groups of three, shared a moment when they experienced or witnessed beloved community.

The business session included the 2023 Budget, the Consent Agenda, Ministry Testimonials by the Center for Christian Formation and Leadership, Sacred Ground, Project Resource, and Invite Welcome and Connect; and the Elections of both clergy and laity for the positions of Standing Committee,

Disciplinary Board. Cathedral Chapter, Sewanee Trustees. Since the number of nominees were equivalent to the number of vacancies, those nominated for these positions were declared elected unanimously. major However. the election was that of the election of clerical and lay deputies to General Convention in 2024. Four (4) deputies each from the clergy

and lay, and two (2) lay and four (4) clerical as

alternate deputies, were elected to represent our diocese at the General Convention, the governing body of the national Episcopal Church. Our Diocese's Deputies and Alternate Deputies are:

Lay Deputies: Ingrid Cheeseborough (Incarnation, Miami), Duncan Hurd (All Saints', Jensen Beach), Michelle Lane (St. James the Fisherman, Islamorada), and Jean Milien (St. Paul's et Les Martyr d' Haiti,

Miami). Lay Alternate Deputies: Vincent Adderley (Transfiguration, Miami), and Joan Smith (Grace, West Palm Beach). Clerical Deputies: Canon Debra Andrew Maconaughey (St. Columba, Marathon), Fr. Tony Holder (All Saints', Jensen Beach), Rev. Roberta Knowles (Incarnation, Miami), and Fr. Sanford Groff (St. Mark's, Palm Beach Gardens). Clerical Alternate Deputies: Fr. Horace Ward (Holy Family, Miami Gardens), Archdeacon Hal Hurley (St. Patrick's, West Palm Beach), Fr. Ben Anthony (St. Andrew's School, Boca Raton), and Fr. Derek Larson (Good Shepherd, Tequesta).

During the Convention, delegates were also given the choice to attend one (1) of the four (4) workshops offered, including a Report of the 2022 General Convention, Eucharistic Visitors Training, Safe Church II, and the South Florida

Haiti Project.

The Convention adjourned after The Very Rev. Corinne Olson announced that the 54th Diocesan Convention will be held on October 27 and 28, 2023, in the Deanery of South Palm Beach.

Our Middle School and high school children are very excited about All Saints' new acolyte program



After a year of fund raising and a global pandemic; cemetery monument restoration experts from the National Park Services were finally on the

campus! They were here to teach us how to restore and reassemble the older and displaced monuments.



Dennis Montagna is the Acting Program Manager for History Preservation and Assistance in the Philadelphia Regional Office of the National Park Service. Не also directs the Park Service's Monument Research Preservation Program, which comprehensive provides assistance in the interpretation and care of historic cemeteries, outdoor sculpture and public monuments to managers of

National Park sites and to other constituents nationwide. Dennis currently serves as President of the Association for Gravestone Studies.

Jason Church is the Chief of Technical Services at the **National** Center for Preservation Technology and Training. He completed his MFA in Historic Preservation at the Savannah College of Art and Design. Over the past 15 years with the National Park Service, Jason presented over 100 cemetery care lectures and workshops. He is a Professional Associate of the American Institute for



the Conservation of Historic and Artistic Works and the current Conservation Chair of the Association for Gravestone Studies.

They began their work on the some of the most

severely sunken and separated monuments. For example, the monument for Caroline Geves had been buried quite deep.

After raising the monument and it's base from below ground level and cleaning it, the

monument now looks complete.

On Tuesday, October 18, a group of 22

individuals from our area gathered to take instruction from Dennis Montagna and Jason Church. Those included: Halpatiokee

their bases. With the help of a tripod and a mechanical pulley system, staff can now lift and replace larger monuments that have sunken and/or are separated from their bases.

Two of the worst monuments on the hillside were next to each other:

- + Lela M. Gardner who died in 1944 and
- + Benjamin Franklin Turner who died in 1929

Ms. Gardner's monument had sunk nearly half

way so that only her name was showing. Mr. Turner's monument had also sunk, so that the bottom base was missing and the top had become separated from its base and was leaning on the base (see pictures).

After the monuments were lifted, cleaned and reset by our maintenance staff & the park service professionals, the

Peering Into the Past

As we come to the end of the vear 2022 and have watched the war in the Ukraine go on and on, some will remember that from 2014 until early in 2017, St Barbara's Congregation of the Ukrainian Orthodox Church shared our church on a trial in basis. They gave us an icon of St. Barbara as an icon. St. Barbara, (died c. 200 ce; feast day December 4), is a legendary virgin martyr of the early church. Venerated as one of the 14 Auxiliary Saints (Holy Helpers), she is invoked in thunderstorms and is the patron saint of artillerymen and miners.

This is the first recorded time this church building was shared with a congregation of another denomination.

Garden Happenings!



"Since, then, we have a great high priest who has passed through the heavens, Jesus, the Son of God, let us hold fast to our confession. For we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses, but we have one who in every respect has been tested, as we are, yet without sin. Let us therefore approach the throne of grace with boldness, so that we may receive mercy and find grace to help in the time of need." – Hebrews 4:14-16.

"When it comes to navigating life, prayer is our spiritual ballast. The Bible may be God's compass that points us in the right direction. But only a living relationship with our Lord, nurtured and deepened by prayer will keep us upright in the storm. One of the Bible's great passages on prayer is found in Hebrews 4." – Gary Inrig, True North.

For many in our parish, when they think of the Men's Fellowship, they think of cooking pancakes, putting up and taking down tents, moving furniture, pressure washing sidewalks, antique car shows and delicious barbeque. It is true, these are some of the outward and visible signs of our work for the LORD and his church.

There is more to us than those outward signs. When we gather, we always begin our meetings with a time of prayer. We give thanks to God for our lives, our relationships, and to lift each other up in prayers for strength, healing, and hope. We make intercessions for members of our church and friends that are ill, suffering, or struggling. We follow the Apostle Paul's admonition to "give thanks in all circumstances." It is a time to experience connection and empathy as we share our common tests, weaknesses, and source of strength.

We also join in a meal - an agape meal if you will. It is usually simple, often prepared or presented by our own hands. Our meetings last about an hour and half and are held once a month. Most of that time is given over to prayer, sharing news of our lives and loved ones, eating in silence (not a rule but a sign of how delicious the food!)

Our business meetings are brief and generally informal as we review plans for our events and consider various ways and means of meeting the needs of the parish or of nearby charities.


It is a brief respite, once a

month to be without the "clanging cymbals" of the world - telephones, television, social media and other noise - that distorts our perception of our true purpose as Christian men.

For those of you who do not regularly attend our meetings, I encouraged you to do so. Participation in our brotherhood and practicing our Christian disciplines of prayer, worship and generosity has been a great boon in my life. It could be in yours too. It only requires setting aside my busy life and intentionally making time to practice these disciplines with likeminded men. I pray you


