these two commandments, through his life, work, ministry, and service, and calls us all to do the same.







Peering Into the Past

An original letter on the bank stationary, from Percy Fuge, cashier at the Stuart Bank & Trust Co. of Stuart to Mr. M. R. Cartwright, All Saints' Church, Stuart, dated 11 January [1929] gives a snapshot of the financial picture of our church in the latter part of the roaring 20's.

"Dear Sir,

As you know we hold in our files your note, All Sts. Church payable to the order of O. B. Fickle, which came due December 4th.

We sent you a couple of notices, but you have not given it your attention yet.

We know you want to cooperate with us in not having past due paper in our files at this time, so to bring your note up to date we are charging the All Saints Church account \$7.50, which will pay the interest on this note up to March 4, 1929, at which time you may be in shape to take care of it."



There is nothing more on file to tell us how and when this debt was paid, nor how this debt was incurred. We are grateful to those who came before us that they paid the debt and that we are not in this financial situation these days.
