A Message From the Rector

January 31, 2023

My Dear Friends:

Clergy Silent Retreat:

A Forerunner for Lent

I am sitting in the peacefulness of my room looking out onto the beautiful lawns and water at Our Lady of Florida Spiritual Center in North Palm Beach.

It is the second day of our clergy silent retreat. Together with Deacon Alan and a number of the clergy in our Diocese, we pause for a moment of

respite from the busyness of parish ministry and life in general as we prepare for the Season of Lent. We meet for what was once called the Clergy Pre-Lenten Retreat, a time of prayer and reading, participation in daily services, meditative addresses, and meals. It is an occasion for us to reflect and prepare

for the solemnity and penitential nature of

The retreat started on Monday, January 30 and will end on Thursday, February 2. There are eight addresses, three meals a day, four opportunities for worship (Eucharist, Morning and Evening Prayers and Compline), with silence being observed throughout the retreat except during worship. Clergy are leading the services and reading biblical the

> readings and Prayers of the People. Deacon Alan read the gospel and led the Prayers at Tuesday's Eucharist while I will lead Evening Prayer on Wednesday.

This year, our retreat is led by the Reverend Dr. Canon Lizette Larson-Miller, Canon Precentor in the Diocese of Huron, Canada. Canon Lizette's theme and focus is on "I am the vine; you are the branches... abide in me

As we prepare for Lent, which begins this

year on February 22, Ash Wednesday, the season is an opportunity for us to contemplate on what Jesus did on the cross for us on Good Friday and to prepare for the celebration of His victory over sin and death on the cross at Easter. Previously, during this season, people observed a period of fasting, repentance, renewal, self-denial, and spiritual discipline. Such observances were a means of reflecting on our sinful nature and our fragility as human beings, as we seek to deepen our relationship with the Lord. That same opportunity is still available to us today during Lent.

We all need to retreat, to get away from the busyness of life, for reflection and renewal, for self-denial and penitence, and for drawing closer in our relationship with God. As followers of Christ, we should carve out a few minutes each day to be with God. We need quiet time to recharge, to reflect, to pray, and to listen to God, and to hear what He is saying to us. We will not know what He has in store for us, neither can He reveal Himself more to us if we are not listening or engaging with Him regularly.

The Daughters of the King of our Church will be holding a Lenten Quiet Day on Saturday, March 11, and all are invited to attend. It will be a time to retreat and spend some time with God.

May we, therefore, spend this Lenten Season engaging in disciplines that help us to examine ourselves, live more spiritually healthy lives, and to embrace a closer relationship with God and each other. God gives us chances after chances after chances

to make this happen. Let us welcome and accept those opportunities.

Deacon's Report

All our programs are now underway for 2023. Kairos Prison Program has started training for our next full Kairos Weekend which will take place on Thursday, March 16th and through Sunday, March 18th. We gather at Martin Correctional Institution (MCI) on Thursday evening for introductions and then all day on Friday, March 17th, Saturday, March 18th and Sunday, March 19th. The weekend is designed to bring the transforming love of God, Jesus Christ and the Holy Spirit to prisoners at MCI to help them know that they are cared for and loved. They develop positive support for being worthy of God's love even in prison. It makes a huge difference in their lives.



The volunteer training runs for three hours a week for eight weeks at Church of the Advent in Palm City. We have about fifty volunteers who will minister to forty-two residents at the

prison. Church of the Advent is very close to the prison; they provide housing for some of the volunteers on Thursday, Friday, and Saturday evenings. They also host an outstanding dinner for us on Thursday evening. In addition to this Kairos (God's time) weekend, Kairos has monthly reunions for the men on the third Saturday of every month and retreats for men who have completed the weekend to refresh their spiritual experience on an ongoing basis.

This past Saturday we held a retreat for thirty-two residents on the theme of "shame" and its effect on all of our lives. Shame can so dominate our feelings about ourselves and lead to the commission of serious violations of the law. We worked on how we change this through living our lives as Christians.

Kairos has two other major programs. *Kairos Outside* is for women who have a close relative in prison. The weekend is provided for free and includes transportation and child care. It gives these women support for their lives which are often unstable with their men incarcerated. The other program is called *Torch*. It is a Kairos weekend for youth, aged 25 and younger, who are institutionalized due to criminal offenses. This weekend is followed by six months of one on one mentoring.

Thank you all for your support of Kairos through prayers and financial contributions.



What is their story?

I bet you know that February 14th is Valentine's Day; I thought we'd all like a love story to enjoy the holiday.

Today, I'm going to tell you about the Helmers. Salomea Lis was born in Poland in 1924. She was a practicing Christian, baptized into the Roman Catholic Church and

survived five years of imprisonment in a Nazi Labor camp during World War II. At this point, we do not know why she was imprisoned. After liberation she married Robert Quinn Helmer and immigrated to the United States.

Robert Helmer was born on September 11, 1920 in Hayden, Ohio. He was a member of Army 759 Railroad Battalion and a veteran of World War II. He was also baptized into the Roman Catholic Church.

Together, Sally (as Salomea was known) and Robert had four children, two boys and two girls. From the picture we have, left, contributed by their son Matthew Helmer, they appear to be a young couple very much in love.

Mr. Helmer retired from his position as trainmaster for New York Central Railroad



and he and Sally moved to Jensen Beach. At the time of his death in 2000, at the age 79, they lived on Nettles Island.

At some point after this, Sally moved to South Carolina to be closer to her daughter, Marja

McGinnis. She passed on October 31, 2003. She was survived by two sisters in Poland, three children, ten grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.



In April we will be having elections for new officers for Women's Fellowship. We hope




there'll be some volunteers who would like to help out as President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer.

LENT-MADNESS

Lent Madness began in 2010 as the brainchild of the Rev. Tim Schenck, now the Rector of Bethesda-by-the-Sea, Palm Beach. In seeking a fun, engaging way for people to learn about the men and women comprising the Church's Calendar of Saints, Rev. Tim came up with this unique Lenten devotion. Combining his love of sports with his passion for the lives of the saints, Lent Madness was born.

The format is straightforward: 32 saints are placed into a tournament-like single elimination bracket. Each pairing remains open for a set period of time and people vote for their favorite saint. Sixteen saints make it to the Round of the Saintly Sixteen; eight advance to the Round of the Elate Eight; four make it to the Faithful Four; two to the Championship; and the winner is awarded the coveted Golden Halo (see page 12).

The first round consists of basic biographical information about each of the 32 saints. Things get a bit more interesting in the subsequent rounds as we offer quotes and quirks, explore legends, and even move into the area of saintly kitsch. If you're not sure about terminology, check out our glossary.

This year, we again have four "celebrity bloggers" to champion particular saints through the Faithful Four. We also have a website, lentmadness.org, a printable bracket (on page 12), a poster-sized bracket, weekly Monday Madness videos, and the Saintly Scorecard, an annual publication containing all 32 first round bios, information about how to participate in Lent Madness as a congregation, and an essential Vocabulary List to decipher all things Lent Madness.

We've also inspired thousands of people along the way by forming an online community of people who are passionate about taking their faith but not themselves too seriously. Articles and spots about Lent Madness have appeared in the Washington Post, NPR, Huffington Post, FOX News, NBC, USA Today, and even Sports Illustrated.

As Lent Madness continues to grow and evolve, what won't change is the essence of Lent Madness: allowing people to get to know some amazing people who have come before us in the faith and reminding one another that there's no reason for a dreary Lenten discipline. If this helps people connect with the risen Christ during this season of penitence and renewal, and have a bit of fun in the process, then it continues to be worthwhile.

Starting the first Thursday of Lent (the day after Ash Wednesday), we'll begin daily "eliminations" of the saints, the first bracket is Augustine of Hippo against Hippolytus of Rome. Each day (excluding Sundays and most Saturdays), hop on over to lentmadness.org, read about the saints in the bracket and record your vote. The Golden Halo is awarded on Wednesday of Holy Week.

We hope you'll participate fully this Lent and vote with reckless abandon! (Vote Once -- this isn't Chicago).

I hope you will. There is absolutely nothing better you can do than abandon yourself to His will, provision and protection. That is the path through adversity to abundant,


fulfilling, joyous life.

Peering Into the Past

February is Black History Month

Since 1976, every U.S. president has designated the month of February as Black History Month. As parish historian, I was asked last year, "Do you know when All Saints was desegregated?" My response is "No" and here's why.

Having reviewed <u>ALL</u> the Vestry minutes, I have found no documentation about segregation or desegregation. We/the Church do not record race in our list of Communicants or the other canonical membership records. By-laws for the parish didn't exist until the 2000's.

We do know that the cemetery was officially desegregated in their by-laws in 1974. In practice, the cemetery was desegregated earlier: Curtis F. Williams, SP 4, from Rio, was killed during the Vietnam War and is our first documented African-American burial. He was buried in 1967.

From the document reviews and discussions I've had, the multicultural aspect of our church has nothing to do with church laws (canons). The only resources I have to use are photo directories and recollections of

members who attended All Saints' as children (now grown) and the members who have been here the longest, who I queried.

The best answer I've found to this question is that George and Phyllis Nicholas were the first African-American parishioners to be in a photo directory.


