# A Message From the Rector



My Dear Friends:

### St. Patrick of Ireland, Bishop and Missionary

The Feast of St. Patrick, Bishop and Missionary, and Patron Saint of Ireland, is celebrated each year on **March 17**, the day on which Patrick died around A.D. 461. He is probably the only Christian saint that is give such prominence and celebration annually in our country and other parts of the world. For not only is Saint Patrick's Day the national holiday of Ireland, but it is also widely celebrated in the U.S., Canada, Great Britain, Australia, and New Zealand. Department stores usually showcase items, usually in the color, green, which market the day. No other patron feast bears such distinction in the secular or commercialized world.

Although I am not Irish, it is a memorial day for me since it is the anniversary of the death of my paternal grandmother. She was the only grandmother I knew because my maternal grandmother died before I was born.

But who really is St. Patrick? Patrick was not born in Ireland but on the northwest coast of

Britain, in the late 4th century, sometime around A.D. 390. He was born into a Christian family, with his grandfather being a priest and his father, a deacon. His father was also an important official in the Roman imperial government of Britain.

At the age of sixteen, Patrick was captured by a band of Irish slave-raiders. He was taken to Ireland and forced to serve as a shepherd. When he was about twenty-one, he escaped and returned to Britain, where he was educated as a Christian. In about A.D. 431, through a vision, Patrick felt called to return to Ireland as a missionary, having been ordained a priest and bishop without being assigned any known diocese at the time. He would arrive not far from where he settled when he was captured before, near what is now known as Downpatrick (a "down" or "dun" is a fortified hill, which was the fortress of


which was the fortress of a local Irish king).

Although Christianity was present in Ireland at the time, Patrick began the process of missionary conversion throughout

the country that continued until his death. He confronted and eliminated the pagan rites of the Druids, making Christianity more widespread, established monasteries, churches, and schools, had crosses carved on old druidic pillars, and placed sacred wells and springs under the protection of Christian saints. It is also believed that St. Patrick used the shamrock, a three-leaf clover, as a way to explain the divine Trinity. It would become the national plant of Ireland.

St. Patrick is said to have established his

principal church (cathedral) at Armagh, which is regarded as primatial diocese of all Ireland. The name of the principal church is, you guessed it, St. Patrick's Cathedral. It is the seat of the Anglican Archbishop of Armagh and Diocese of Armagh, but was originally the site of a Celtic Christian monastery, said to have been founded by St Patrick.

The popularity of the celebration of St. Patrick's Day is believed to have begun by immigrants, particularly to the United States, who transformed the day into a largely secular holiday of revelry and celebration of all things Irish. The celebrations became a way for large numbers of Irish immigrants to connect with their roots after they moved to America. Parades were held as early as the 18th century in Boston and New York, and since 1962, Chicago has colored its river green to mark the holiday. It should also be noted that blue was the traditional color associated with St. Patrick, however, green is

now commonly connected with the day. The wearing of green clothing or clothing with a shamrock is common attire for the day. Corned beef and cabbage are associated with the holiday, and beer is sometimes dyed green to celebrate the day.

We give God thanks for the life, work, ministry, and service, of St. Patrick of Ireland, Bishop and Missionary.

### Collect for St. Patrick

Almighty God, in your providence you chose your servant Patrick to be the apostle of the Irish people, to bring those who were wandering in darkness and error to the true light and knowledge of you: Grant us so to walk in that light that we may come at last to the light of everlasting life; through

Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. **Amen.**

## Deacon's Report

I wrote at some length about Kairos Prison Ministry in my last month's report. I think most of you have some familiarity of this ministry and my extensive involvement with Kairos for over 10 years. I am also the Pastoral Care Coordinator and the Administrator of the TRUE fund, to which I devote considerable time. But I give the most time to Kairos, especially this month. We have our Kairos 54 weekend March 16-20, a full three-and-a-halfday weekend.



We will provide this weekend to 36 residents of Martin Correctional Institution in Indiantown. I am asking you to provide very tangible support of Kairos at this time.

Some people are already helping us.

Dara did two posters for the weekend. They will be put up on during a talk called "You Are Not Alone," when we put up multiple posters from all over the world to let residents know that they are not alone. Of course, many prisoners feel alone.

In addition, we present them with a large prayer wheel that has signed slips of paper showing when people will pray for them, throughout the entire weekend. I will have prayer slips for you all to sign in Houg Hall.

Each volunteer is asked to present money to Kairos to pay for expenses during the weekend, especially food for residents throughout the weekend. The food we buy gives residents a break from the barely adequate food they get in the Dining Room. Our objective for the entire weekend is to bring to them the transforming love and forgiveness of Jesus Christ, which significantly changes their lives in the institution and when they are released.

We recently received a letter from one of the residents who was released last year after attending our weekend in March 2022. He stated that his experience with Kairos made a significant change in his life. He is now working and attending AA meetings regularly. He attributes all the positive changes in his life to Kairos.

A recent study shows that prisoners who attend Kairos have far lower recidivism rates than those who don't go to Kairos.


# Women's Fellowship


Our February meeting for the Women's Fellowship was our High Tea. 96 people attended and over 30 men and women helped to make the event a huge success.

If you don't know, the Ashley Gang was a group of bank robbers, moonshiners and general outlaws who operated in



# Peering Into the Past

### In September 1973,

### "All Saints in Jensen Sets Schedule:

"Getting to Know You" will be the theme for the women of All Saints' Episcopal Church in Jensen Beach. The program is geared toward getting first-hand knowledge of the faith and practices of other Christian groups in the area. The church, whose pastor is the Rev. Frank Alvarez, will begin its fall service schedule Oct. 7. Holy Eucharist will be at 7:30 a.m.; Sung Eucharist, sermon and Sunday school at 9:15 a.m., and the Holy Eucharist and sermon at 11 a.m. each Sunday.

"Two women's groups are involved in the parish — All Saints' Guild, which meets on the second Tuesday of each month at 1 p.m., and St. Ann's Guild, which meets on the second Tuesday at 7:30 p.m. Among the speakers scheduled throughout the year for both women's groups are the Rev. Neil Gunsalus, of Trinity United Methodist Church of Jensen; the Rev. Fr. Michael Sullivan, assistant pastor of St. Joseph's Church of Stuart; the Rev. Clinton Martow, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Stuart; the Rev. William Schepman; pastor of the Church of the Redeemer of Stuart; the Rev. Robert J. Barman and the Rev. Richard Gray of the Stuart First Presbyterian Church, and the Rev. Craig Pooser, pastor of the Holy Faith Episcopal Church of Port St. Lucie...."

Holy Faith Episcopal Church is on the east side of U.S. 1, just north of the River Park, Port. St. Lucie residential area. The seeds were sown for the creation of this congregation in early 1964. Mr. and Mrs. John Hermann and Mr. and Mrs. Gilbert Heine, members of All Saints were part of the founding members.

At that time St. Martin de Porres Catholic Church had not been established, and Trinity United Methodist Church wasn't built on Savannah Road. All Saints was right where it is today! Thanks be to God!






