# A MESSAGE FROM THE RECTOR

My Dear Friends:

### The 125<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of All Saints'

In the last decade of the 19<sup>th</sup> century, the county was Brevard, the area was Waveland, the diocese was named the Missionary

Diocese of Southern Florida, and the bishop was the Right Reverend William C. Grav, a church named All Saints' Episcopal was formed. A century-anda-quarter years later, in the early part of the 21<sup>st</sup> century, the county is Martin, the area is Jensen Beach, the diocese is named the Episcopal Diocese of South-east Florida, and the bishop is the Right Reverend Peter Eaton, a church named All Saints' Episcopal, continues to be a viable presence in the community. While

everything around it has changed, All Saints' continues to be the invariable.

On November 1, 2023, the Feast of All Saints, we will begin the celebrations of our Quasquicentennial Anniversary. These celebrations will last for one year, ending on



All Saints' Day (November 1) 2024. It has been 125 years that our Church as the people and

the building have provided a profound spiritual presence within this community. The cornerstone of the church edifice was laid on December 5, 1898, while its' dedication took place on February 19, 1899. We are the oldest church in Martin County and one of the oldest in our diocese.

### Deacon's Report

As we enter the Pentecost season, we celebrate the coming of the Holy Spirit, which Jesus sent to inspire us in our lives as Christians. Pentecost is also the birthday of our Church. We need to look at what the Holy Spirit is telling us about how we can be even better Christians.

I am considering how to improve my ministries.

With the help of George Mazsa and Father Tony, we are looking more closely at the TRUE Fund, which stands for Toward the Relief of Urgent Emergencies. In 2019, we had 25 requests and gave out more than \$3,000. We are not getting as many requests since the COVID-19 pandemic. We have money to help and we want to let people know how we can help them. Recently, the Vestry raised the amount we can give from \$150 to \$200. We usually contact other agencies, including House of Hope and the Salvation Army and try to supplement their work.

TRUE is available for members of our church and for residents of our local communities. Perhaps you know of individuals who may be in need and can talk with us.

We work with Robert Negron to help some residents of the halfway house he runs for former substance abusers.

My other ministries include Kairos Prison Ministry and a Bible Study Group on Thursday afternoons at Martin Correctional Institution, which I have been doing for over 10 years.

State prisoners' needs are numerous. Many prison residents have been transformed by Kairos and by the love of Jesus Christ. Their whole lives change because we facilitated their love of Christ and brought them an alternative lifestyle.

We also offer lay Eucharistic services bringing Communion to some of our members who are unable to come to church.

We appreciate the support of all congregants. Thank you. I think we try to be a truly helpful Christian Community and continue to work on bringing the love of Christ to all people.



# All Saints' Cemetery



Come and help bring the cemetery records into the 21<sup>st</sup> century.

Our historic cemetery records are on a system of

rolodexes, paper maps, and scanned documents.

Pam Hurd and I have worked feverishly since November 2022, to get our cemetery burial documentation into the 21<sup>st</sup> century. We've leveraged the work of Bowman Consultants who documented all of our gravestones and found unmarked graves with ground penetrating radar in December 2020/January 2021 and the paper and scanned records from the Cemetery Office.

Cemify is the cemetery management software program we are



implementing. It will enable the staff to do many things they can't easily do now, such as printing sales documents with the information pre-filled, automating reports on sales, knowing the number of in-ground or mausoleum locations available for cremains or casket burials, or retrieving information on those who are interred here.

Getting the scanned documents into the Cemify is the challenge at hand.

We have only two people in our office, who together work 40 hours per week. They cannot do this in addition to the work they do day to day to serve the needs of our clients and families. So please join me.

### **TRUE Fund**

The TRUE Fund, Toward the Relief of Urgent Emergencies, is a fund that is available here at All Saints to help parishioners and members of the local community deal with unexpected bills or loss of income. It is supported by donations and receives no funding from the church's operating budget.

The Fund is administered by Deacon Alan and all requests should come through the Church Office, not directly to Deacon Alan. Gifts are limited to \$200, and the Fund can only be accessed once a year per client.

Types of situations the Fund can address are:

- Overdue utility bills
- Medical bills or prescription drugs
- Food relief
- Transportation issues, including repairs or insurance
- Home repairs
- Other needs.

Clients who need food are usually referred to local food banks, but emergency gift cards can be dispensed.

The Fund exists to help people in need. If you know someone in this type of situation, please let them know help is available here.

I am also asking those who can contribute to consider donating to the Fund so we can help as many as possible.

Jesus tells us "whatsoever you do for the least of these, you do for me".


## All Saints' Sunday School

## **Finance Ministry Moment**



Your "Treasury Team" as the All Saints' Finance Team is affectionally called, is composed of parishioners dedicated to maintaining the financial health of our "Little Church on the Hill with a Big Heart."

Led by Treasurer, Bill
Winsemann, and assisted by
Assistant Treasurer, Pam Hurd,
the Team includes our
Bookkeeper, Jim Vitale; money
counters, Louise Andrews and
Joan Whitting; and occasional
assistance from other
parishioners; our financial
advisor, Mike Lee, of UBS; and
Hardin White, the Chair of our
Finance Committee.

The Finance Committee (including the Chair, the Treasurer, Assistant Treasurer, Father Tony, and the Chairs of the Heritage Endowment and LeDuc Scholarship Fund) are responsible for making overall investment strategy and disbursement recommendations to the Vestry for approval. Each of the funds (Endowment and Scholarship) have boards that then take the recommended disbursement authorization and decide how and where to advise the Vestry to allocate those funds. The Vestry is the ultimate approval body to make financial decisions for the church, so these committees and boards are doing the leg work to come up with the best recommendations that they can

for the Vestry to act on.

We use several platforms to help us with managing the church's finances. We also have multiple ways that an individual or corporation can donate to our church. There is the weekly collection plate, which includes traditional pledge envelopes, cash and checks, and special designated funds like flowers, memorials, kitchen, etc.). If you would like to learn more as to how you

may donate or you would like to receive pledge envelopes, please contact a member of the Treasury Team or the Church Office.

Secondly, through our online giving platform, we enable parishioners, guests, and friends, to give online via a bank draft or a credit card donation. Using a credit card triggers a fee of about 2.7% whereas the bank draft fee is only 1%, but both ways of giving enable the giver to cover the cost of the fee so that the church can collect the full amount of the pledged money.

New this year, the third way of donating is through Square, which is a credit card processing terminal that sits in the narthex (entrance foyer) of the church building. The beauty of Square compared to other merchant account terminals that process credit cards is that there is no annual or monthly fee, only the credit card processing fee, which again, is about 2.7%.

Finally, we are always happy to receive checks mailed to the Office.

Each week the ushers (or an usher and a vestry member) ensure that the collection plate monies are securely placed in sealed and signed envelopes.

Our money counters (and Sysco, the dog) work tirelessly every week to count the income and allocate to the correct fund and correct giver. They then input this

information into our giving platform. Online contribution's data flows to the same platform automatically. This important work not only ensures that we have an accurate account of income by fund designation, but also enables us to create the vearly statement of giving that each donor needs for their taxes. Indeed, one of the requirements for our nonprofit designation is to ensure that we annually

acknowledge all gifts over a nominal amount.

The Bookkeeper puts the information into QuickBooks,

which is then verified by the assistant treasurer in time for the treasurer to pull a report for the monthly vestry

meeting.

Once a month, or more often if needed, the treasurer reviews the non-standard bills and authorizes them for payment. The Bookkeeper also inputs this information into QuickBooks. If any bill is more than \$500, two people must sign off on authorizing the payment. Those two people can include the Treasurer, the Rector and the Senior Warden for the church's main account. The "standard" or recurring bills (like utility bills) are authorized yearly by the Vestry and do not need

individual signoff every month.

QuickBooks allows us to sign in from wherever we are so we can keep up with our accounting work. (Jim is in Maryland in the summer months). To maintain separation of duties, the Bookkeeper and Assistant Treasurer can input data into QuickBooks but they are not able to move monies between accounts or to sign checks. The Treasurer can sign checks and is authorized to move monies between accounts (including the Endowment and Scholarship accounts) but can only run reports from QuickBooks, not change the underlying data. This separation of duties is standard business practice and is also recommended in The Episcopal Church's "Manual of Business Methods in Church Affairs."

The Treasurer has the ultimate responsibility for reporting to the vestry.

The Treasurer and Assistant Treasurer also support the church's other organizations (Men's Fellowship, Women's Fellowship, TRUE, Endowment, LeDuc Scholarship, and Clergy Discretionary accounts) in their reporting requirements by downloading statements and providing reports on the overall status of their commitments as requested.

All accounts are included in the monthly report to the vestry for an overall picture of the health of our operational and outreach capabilities.

Annually, the Treasurer prepares the budget for the Vestry's approval for the following year.

Finally, yearly or more often as needed, our Finance Committee meets among themselves to review policies and processes and meets with our financial advisor, Mike Lee, to review the status of the market. These meetings help inform recommendations to the vestry on how much of the income/growth we can safely allocate to outreach programs every year.

Your Treasury Team is dedicated to ensuring that our church makes the best use of funds that you provide for the operations and outreach of the church. Thank you for your generosity.

## Peering Into the Past

The St. Lucie News Tribune, Fort Pierce, Florida, on Sunday, April 30, 1950, on page 9 reads:

"Scheduled for Saturday afternoon at 4 p.m. at All Saints' Church at Waveland, the scene of the confirmation and christening of the bride-elect, was the marriage of Miss Aurora Constance Segerstrom of Jensen Beach to Robert Henry Haire of New York City.

The Rev. George P. Huntington, pastor of both the Stuart and Jensen Beach Episcopal Churches, performed the wedding ceremony. Mrs. <u>Charles H. Rue</u> of Stuart played nuptial music and Mrs. T. R. Chambers, also of Stuart, sang.

The bride was given in marriage by her father, <u>Harry T. Segerstrom.</u> Mrs. Jack C. Miller, the former Beverly Pitchford, of West Palm Beach, was matron of honor. Best man was Mr. Miller.

Bridesmaids were <u>Miss Verna Gamble</u> and Miss Roberta Nuner, Jensenites who now live at West Palm Beach. <u>George Warren Shipes</u>, <u>Jr.</u> and Lewis J. Gamble were ushers.

Miss Segerstrom is well known in Martin County, having been graduated from Martin County High School at Stuart, where she was a member of the school band. She attended college in North Carolina for two years before entering Barbizon Modeling School in New York City, where she since has been a professional model.

Haire is a supervisor in an industrial plant in New York.

Following the marriage, a reception was held at the home of the bride's parents. After a honeymoon trip, the bridal couple will go to New York to make their home."

Connie Haire has been on our intercession list for many years. She is now 96 and lives in the house she and her husband built when they returned to Jensen Beach. This home is next to her parents' home on the property originally



owned by her grandfather.

Currently her middle child and surviving daughter, Debbie, lives in Connie's parents' house. Debbie was confirmed March 27, 1967, at All Saints'.

In 1949, a hurricane knocked the church building askew, slightly off its foundation. Harry Segerstrom restored the edifice to its foundation in 1950 –before his daughter's wedding.

The names underlined in this article are interred in our cemetery.





# Daughters of the King

"Lift high the cross, The love of Christ proclaim, Till all the world adore his sacred name."

These are the opening words and the refrain of the hymn of The Order of the Daughters of the King.

As Daughters, we wear a unique cross that symbolizes Christ's love. The message engraved on our cross... Magnanimiter Crucem Sustine,

reminds us... With heart, mind, and spirit uphold and bear the cross.

"Then He said to them all, 'If anyone desires to come after Me, let him deny himself, and

take up his cross daily and follow Me." Luke 9:23

Our cross is a Greek fleury cross with four equal arms, which symbolize the church spreading north, south, east and west. The ends of each arm broaden out into three lobes – fleury or fleurs-de-lis and represent the Holy Trinity.

"Then He told them, 'As you go into all the world, proclaim the gospel to everyone." Mark 16:15

The Daughters of the King is a religious order, and our cross is an outward and visible sign of the order. We wear our cross faithfully, and when we go to meet our Savior, most Daughters elect to be buried with their cross. If not, instructions are left for the cross to be returned to the DOK National Office.

"I haven't seen him on this side of the street in a long while;" said the deep voice of Draco the dragonfly. "Perhaps he is in the Cemetery."


"Oh No-oooo." Greta moaned.


