A MESSAGE FROM THE RECTOR

November 1, 2023
The Feast of All Saints

My Dear Friends:

The Official Start of our 125th Anniversary Celebrations

Today, on this our Feast of Title, we officially begin the 125th Anniversary celebrations of our Church as a family, and of the dedication of our Church building. Although Tuesday, January 23, 1894,



appears to be the earliest Episcopal service in this area as recorded in the diary of the Rt. Rev. William Crane Gray, Missionary Bishop of Southern Florida, any further services seem to be unknown.

However, Archdeacon B. F. Brown apparently led the missionary efforts of planting a church in this community.

The cornerstone of All Saints' was laid on Monday, December 5, 1898, and this date is recognized as its founding. The Church building was dedicated on Sunday, February 19, 1899. It was through the generosity of Charles and Mary Racey that the building of an edifice and the start of a cemetery became a reality. While our cemetery is the only one



in the Episcopal Church of Southeast Florida, the Church building, which has lasted these 125 years, stands as a symbol of God's presence in this community, and the house in which the church gathers for worship and fellowship.

Throughout the years, clergy persons have shared in the leadership of this church and parish. More importantly, thousands of saints made All Saints' their church family and spiritual home for the past 125 years. With the help of God, they have worshiped and served, ministered and reached out, fellowshiped and disciplined, worked and given of their time, talent, and financial resources, so that this church could flourish. We thank God for the lives, work, witness, and ministry, of all these saints.

We now usher in the beginning of the next 125 years. As the early members of this church prepared the way for us, we do the same for future generations. For they have left us

Also our attendance at All Saints' has been increasing with the arrival of fall.

We have had significant losses of some of our most devoted members like Jacques Marzi, Martyn Inwood, and Janet Kempf. They will be really missed, and we empathize with their spouses.

We are definitely an older congregation. We try to offer compassion to all our older members. We help all our homebound members through our Lay Eucharistic Visitors. We all need to reach out to all our members with chronic illnesses. It is sometimes not easy to do this, but trust in the Holy Spirit to help you know what to say to these residents with chronic or acute illnesses. Perhaps we all should commit ourselves to contact others in need once a week: those who are physically, emotionally or even financially in need.

The number of applicants for the TRUE Fund has increased. George Mazsa communicates with other community agencies such as House of Hope and Salvation Army. These agencies have referred others in need of help to us. We don't give much, but just the \$200 we give is so much appreciated and gives many in our community the help they need and increased confidence that their problems will diminish.

The Kairos Inside Program takes place this weekend. Although I can't participate, I am still hopeful that this program is bringing the love of Jesus to these incarcerated men and to women in female prisons. I still lead my Bible Study on Thursday afternoons at Martin Correctional Institution. There is a group of men who are committed to attending my Evening Prayer service and receiving Communion. We sing the Lord's Prayer, which they love to do.

On Nov. 23, I will celebrate my 10th anniversary as deacon at our church. I was ordained Nov. 23, 2013, by Bishop Frade at the cathedral in Miami. I have enjoyed my ministry and feel very connected to our congregation in so many ways.

The “Season” of tending is upon us and the very hot “lazy summer” is behind us. I am pleased to report the Men's Fellowship is busy tending to this season's work in the vineyard of the LORD. Our first meeting of 2023-24 was Monday, Oct. 2. **Our second will be Monday, Nov. 6, at 6 p.m. in Houg Hall.**



We welcome all the men of the parish. I invite each of you to join us in our labors of love. For me, the experience has been full of opportunities to tend to the growth of my relationship with Christ. If your relationship with Him “needs some tending,” our Fellowship might be just the place for you.

We follow ancient Christian practices. We gather to offer thanksgiving to God, to pray, to share a meal, to read scripture and to organize good works to benefit the LORD's church and those who are suffering.

The October meeting included a delicious meal of chicken parmesan (from Anna's) with salad, wine, tea and desserts. Thanks to our treasurer, Harry Kapple, for organizing dinner. It was good, to once again, gather together around the table. We began with a blessing of the food. Then we offered prayers of thanksgiving for our lives today and for healing of the sick and suffering among and known to us.

A new element was added to our usual program.

We agreed to add time during dinner for members to hear, reflect on, and share a reading from the Bible. The Bible passage will be selected each month by a different member of the Fellowship. Our first passage was taken from Paul's First Letter to the Thessalonians, Chapters 4 and 5. George Mazsa volunteered to choose a passage for reflection and discussion on Nov. 6.

Our business agenda included scheduling the election of officers at our November meeting, establishment of 2023-24 dues, selecting a date for the Annual Bar-B-Que and Antique Car Show and dispensing funds to help the church or those in need in our local community.

Dues will continue at \$20 for the year and \$5 per month to offset the cost of meals. We have put forward Saturday, April 13, as our first choice for the date for the Bar-B-Que and Antique Car Show.

The annual Pancake Supper will be on Shrove Tuesday, Feb. 13.

We voted to immediately disburse funds to the Boys and Girls Clubs of Martin and St. Lucie Counties in the amount of \$500 per county. We also immediately disbursed \$1,000 to support the Martin County Tent City Helpers. Thanks go to our brother, Jerry Walters. The Tent City Helpers provide basic necessities to the homeless in Martin County. Jerry donates his time to this work and advocates for support. We will be considering additional disbursements at our next session.

Our meetings are regularly scheduled for the first Monday of each month. Exceptions to the schedule are announced in advance.

Please join us. There is a lot of work to do when tending to Christ's vineyard. We always need more help.



All Saints' Cemetery

Frequent readers of this column know that we have had self-guided tours of the cemetery for several years now.

This year's self-guided tour is *Pioneering Families of Sewall's Point*. Beginning Sunday, Oct 29, the graves of the individuals found in that book have been marked and will remain marked until Monday, Nov. 13 for your touring convenience. The books will be available after the All Souls' Day Service on Nov. 2 after both Sunday services, and are also available through the Cemetery Office Monday-Friday 9 a.m. to 1 p.m.

Funds raised by this year's effort will be used toward replacing the cemetery fencing which has been there since the late 1960s.

They say that imitation is the sincerest form of flattery. Stuart's Fernhill Cemetery on Kanner Highway, aka State Road 76, also had a "Historic Cemetery Tour" this year.



We don't have a six-lane highway going by our peaceful cemetery on the hill, overlooking the Indian River Lagoon, only Brightline going by the western edge.

Is their tour competition? No. It is a good thing to share the history of our communities.
