A MESSAGE FROM THE RECTOR

My Dear Friends:

I originally wrote this reflection for the Wednesday Eucharist and Healing Service on February 28, 2024. It was only after completing it the night before that I realized I was not scheduled to preach but Deacon Alan was. Having checked if I could use it later in the year, and realizing there wasn't a possibility, I decided to share it as my message for the March edition of "The Trumpet" newsletter. Here is that reflection.

The Old Testament reading from Jeremiah [18:1-11] resonates with me because of my time in art school. Pottery was one of the courses I had to take and I quickly realize that shaping a piece of clay into an object is not as easy as one may think. Pottery was one of my most difficult art courses as I tried to spin the potter's wheel with a lump of clay on top to get it into an object like a vase or a bowl. Oftentimes, I failed to get it into a shape that was recognizable, but I tried until I did or else I would fail the course. So, I can easily identify with verse 4 of the reading: "The vessel he was making of clay was spoiled in the potter's hand, and he reworked it into another vessel, as seemed good to him." There can be a lot of spoiling when doing pottery.

Nevertheless, God uses this art, this craft, as a practical lesson for Jeremiah to understand God's relationship with the Hebrew people and the way he interacts with them. God invites Jeremiah to visit a potter's house and to observe how he creates something out of clay. God took Jeremiah away from his familiar environment with the hope that he would hear and discern God's words more clearly, to learn about God more deeply, and to see a new way of how God operates with his people, particularly when it comes to calling them to repentance and conversion.

All this God planned to demonstrate to Jeremiah through watching an artist at work. The God of the Bible is a personal being, and he reveals himself in personal ways. God shows himself by



depicting as someone with whom the Israelites of the day could identify and were familiar. God describes himself as a father, a shepherd, a king, a ruler and judge, a farmer, a teacher and builder, and now as an artist or artisan, in this case, a potter. The idea of God as a potter was not foreign for in Genesis 2:7: "... the Lord God formed man from the dust of the ground, and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life; and the man became a living being." God formed humanity from "... the dust of the ground..." shaping and sculpting and molding humankind from the earth.

But there is an important element that is associated with pottery and clay that God does not do with us when creating us. For when we mold a piece of clay into a vessel, in order for it to be of use, it needs to be fired in a kiln. Clay that has only been molded and not fired is like the raw dough of a loaf of bread... you may pinch away at the raw dough but it doesn't taste as good until it is baked and becomes a loaf of bread. In the same way, even though you may shape or mold a lump of clay into an object, and you could leave it just like that, you do not really enjoy it because it is not functional until it is fired. So, in this

passage, Jeremiah is telling us that we are people who are like clay that has not been fired. That's how God's people are... which leads us to what this passage teaches us?

First, God describes himself as a potter who is able to mold and remold us, his people, who are like clay in his hand: "Just like the clay in the potter's hand, so are you in my hand, O house of Israel." God is able to shape us in various ways because we are malleable. When we allow the world to shape us, we are still impressionable and flexible to be change, to be transformed, to be reshaped by God. He is able to take us with all our weaknesses, limitations and flaws, and rebuild us into the people he calls us to be. Even though, God has created us and we think of God as creating perfectly, yet God has given us freewill, leaving us with room to build our character while at the same time leaving room for him to transform us if or when he needs to do so. In other words, God has made us in such a way that we have the flexibility to change our personalities, our character, our behavior, our attitudes. If, after molding us, God had placed us in a kiln to be fired, we would not be able to change, but we can.

Second, just as the potter has the clay in his hand, and the clay is doing its own thing, not shaping into what he desires it to be, God also has us in his hand even though we are doing our own thing and not shaping into the people God desires us to be. Eventually, as the potter was able to get the clay to be made into

something desirable, "... something that seem good to him..." God can make us into someone desirable that is good to him.

Third, this story shows us that God is willing to forgive and to change his mind when he plans to bring judgment for wrongdoing, provided we are willing to repent: "At one moment I may declare concerning a nation or a kingdom, that I will pluck up and break down and destroy it, but if that nation, concerning which I have spoken, turns from its evil, I will change my mind about the disaster that I intended to bring on it" (verses 7 and 8). It also works the other way: "And at another moment I may declare concerning a nation or a kingdom that I will build and plant it, but if it does evil in

my sight, not listening to my voice, then I will change my mind about the good that I had intended to do to it" (verses 9 and 10). Even those we may consider as the most wicked people on the earth, God is willing to forgive if they are truly penitent and ask for forgiveness. He forgave and refused to bring destruction on the people of Nineveh to whom he sent Jonah to warn them of what was imminent. When Nineveh decided to repent, he spared their lives. God does not wish to destroy us even when we are rebellious

and disobedient, as the Hebrew people were. He is willing, when we are truly sorry, to forgive and redeem us, remaking us into a beautiful piece of pottery.

That is what God wishes to do with all of us... remake us into beautiful pieces of pottery for his kingdom. **Amen.**

I use the Evening Prayer service with four Bible readings and give them consecrated Communion wafers. We always end the group with the Prayer of St Francis which was one of Father Steve Fregeau's favorite prayers. We all will miss him very much.

As we are aware of the needs of members who are confined to home due to acute or chronic conditions, we make Eucharistic visits. Please advise me of those who would appreciate a home visit. These visits are very much appreciated.

I continue to do what I can as a deacon to meet the needs of our Church and community.



FUNd Raising Team


The Fundraising Team is still in need of more members. We try to put the FUN in Fundraising.

Brief History of Church Building

"I see Dead People:" The people who have left us this wonderful worship space.



Charles and Mary Racey who donated the property upon which the church was originally built and where our cemetery had its beginning. Charles who as treasurer was able to raise funds to totally pay for the construction of the building.

All Saints' is one of many carpenter gothic style churches built throughout Florida, built with the virgin pine wood locally available. The interior is covered in orange shellac and held together with handmade nails. By 1926, all the

original stained glass windows with screens were in. Screens were high technology of the day and keeping



mosquitos out was important.


This church was a social hub in the earliest days and welcomed seasonal clergy from many different states, as well as seasonal residents.

I see **Frederick Willes** who served as a vestryman and senior warden who cared for the church and cemetery for some 35 years. **Ben Fulton, Sr.**, saved the building from a brush fire.

We were spared from hurricanes down through the decades, losing little more than shingles.

I remember **John D. Barnwell** and the vestry of the late 1950s, who realized that the area would boom after World War II, that veterans would return as tourists or as retirees for the beautiful, fish filled waters and lovely temperate climate. These were the men who had the fellowship hall built in 1961.

Carl Houg had the church moved in 1963 to where we are today for only \$800.





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Thanks to the bequest of funds by **Isabel Kline** and the wise decision making of our 2nd Rector, the **Rev. Norman B. Feaster**, we sit today in air-conditioned comfort. This the building was available for all who came seeking comfort when President Kennedy was assassinated.



The final expansion of the church building was under the supervision of our 6th Rector, the **Rev. Thomas Ryan, Jr.,** connecting the west side of the building with the east side of Houg Hall and expanding the choir loft, in 1994.

This house of worship has

been a place of comfort from the days when our English immigrant founders had this building constructed until today. This architecture and dark wood



remind many of their church "up north." It is warm, welcoming, and covered with a patina of prayer.

We are surrounded with the beauty of the work of many craftsmen and women – those who milled the wood, constructed the church and furnishings, created the windows, and stitched the needlepoint kneelers.



We aren't called to maintain a museum, but a house of worship for today and for the generations coming after us.


